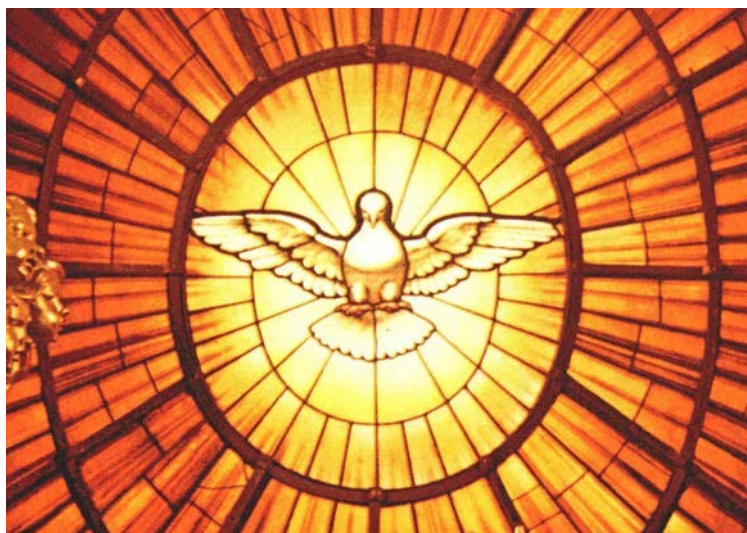

The Lord is my strength and my shield, in whom my heart trusted and found help. (Psalm 28:7)

Caregiving. This role is not always chosen but arrives suddenly for some while gradually for others. Many people provide loving care for family, friends, and sometimes strangers. It is a role with physical demands, emotional ties, and organizational tasks. Some caregivers work in tandem with a facility while other caregivers are 100% at home with their loved one. The latter was the case for Patricia Pence when she cared for her husband.

Pat and Bill Pence were married for twenty-three years this past August. While the majority of those years were spent in typical fashion, the last eight years included Bill's declining health. Thus, Pat assumed the role of caregiver, lovingly ministering to her husband "until death do us part." Whether it was going to doctor appointments, assisting with personal needs, seeking entertainment, pushing a wheelchair, or attending Mass, Pat was at Bill's side. Many people witnessed her quiet, loving, faith-filled actions time and time again.

Pat recognizes how the Catholic faith and her relationship with God were prominent in her ability to perform the caregiver role which at different times was scary, exhausting, humbling, or overwhelmingly joyful. She mentioned the following things which strengthened her during that time: sharing prayers with her spouse, being firmly dedicated to her marriage vows, recognizing blessings, and finding heavenly comfort revealed through nature. One striking decision additionally resonating her faith was Pat's decision to execute certain tasks as if she were caring for Jesus Himself. It was not always easy or pleasant to be a caregiver, but her faith allowed Pat to gracefully and lovingly meet each challenge and ultimately to allow Bill to pass into the arms of Jesus this last September.

"Life has changed, not ended" was Pat's personal reminder as she and Bill redefined normal throughout



the years. She and Bill continued to make decisions together and she fostered his involvement in daily activities as well. In reflection, she offers the following advice for others in the caregiver role: 1) Find time for outings so that you can bring news back to the one at home. 2) Allow family and friends to assist you in the caregiver role. 3) Take care of your own health. 4) Be an active advocate for your loved one. 5) Remember that your caregiving tasks also can be your prayers. And finally, remind yourself that God is in charge.

Pat humbly acknowledges that there are many, many others who also have a caregiving role. Those who face this role with their Catholic faith firmly set in head, heart, and hand (just as Pat did) surely carry out a special mission for God. And that is why Patricia Pence is recognized as today's Catholic-In-Action.

ORA ET LABORA

Events continued to unfold at *Catholic SPIRIT Radio* during the third quarter of the year, including some significant challenges and blessings. As if the COVID-19 pandemic and other problems associated with 2020 hadn't been enough already, we experienced substantial, expensive problems with equipment but also received some great help from donors.

Facilities

- Transmitters near Saybrook (WSPI) and in Pontiac (WPJC) encountered significant and costly electrical problems late June through mid-July. While it seems that *Old Scratch* has been working overtime to keep us off the air, there were several major donors whose better angels have come to our aid; thanks be to God!
- The effective radiating power of our WPJC transmitter (88.3 FM) in Pontiac dropped from 1,500 watts to 450 watts on July 4th (30% of our licensed maximum) due to electrical problems that occurred a day earlier. Then, when a powerful thunderstorm passed through Pontiac on July 19th, our antenna evidently was stuck by lightning destroying both antenna and transmitter components. The radiating power was again dropped, but this time to 150 watts, only 10% of our licensed power. The repairs required the replacement of a universal power supply and a fuse in our studio-to-transmitter microwave link, parts and repairs for transmitter, combiner, and antenna, new cabling, and a tower climb to diagnose antenna problems and then remove part of our antenna for repair. By August 29th, limited repairs were made allowing us to increase output to 67% of our maximum operating power. On October 7th, the repaired antenna was returned to the transmission tower. Still, the problem of not operating at full power was unsolved. This is likely due to some sort of "cascade failure" in other transmitter elements. We continue to search for the final solution. The cost of this work and equipment thus far is \$7,000. Additional repair work and one more tower climb must take place before we can return the transmitter to full power. Fortunately, *SPIRIT Radio* had sufficient financial reserves to play to these costly repairs.
- Our WSPI (89.5 FM) transmitter near Saybrook failed without warning on July 7th and we were off the air for parts of July 7-8. Following efforts to correct the failure likely caused by overheating, we were able to begin

transmitting the next day at 20% of our 6,000-watt licensed power. Due to intractable problems with the failed transmitter (purchased used in 2011) and two components called exciters, the transmitter had to be completely replaced. It will soon be situated in a newly constructed housing with supplemental air conditioning. The combined cost of replacement, repairs, and new components will be about \$17,000 (to say nothing of the value of the volunteer labor) by the time the work is done.

Thankfully, a dedicated listening couple came forward with a gift to cover the entire cost of the new transmitter, its housing, and a new AC unit. The new transmitter has a maximum radiating power from of only 3,850 watts (allowing us to broadcast at about 60% of our 6,000-watt licensed maximum) but purchasing a more powerful transmitter was out of the question due to our limited financial means. Only the fringes of our listening area will be affected by this lower power.

- The broadcast from our Lincoln translator (97.1 FM) seems to intermittently fail due to faulty internet service. We still need to mount a receiver antenna high up on a tower in Lincoln to pick up our radio signal from Saybrook – another costly endeavor that is being delayed for the time being. This might necessitate the move of our antenna to a new tower in the Lincoln area.
- Our translator in Bloomington (92.5 FM) continues to hum along without significant problem. It appears as though recently someone has been "playing games" with our power shut-off switch which has knocked us off the air several times. That problem has been resolved, but "when it rains, it pours" as the old saying goes.
- The final phase of work associated with our move to new offices within the Great Plains Media building at 108 Boeykens Place in Normal is drawing to a close. Our new office is up and running, most of our electronics have been moved from their prior location, and we are now installing a new production studio and office space dedicated solely to the use of *SPIRIT Radio*. Fortunately, a dedicated donor couple has given the station \$3,500 to help cover the costs of the move. We are looking forward to an open house after the start of the new year so we can showcase

these important and necessary additions to *SPiRiT Radio* and celebrate the station’s 10th anniversary next March. Stay tuned for details.

- To assist with financial matters, *SPiRiT Radio* has appointed one of its Advisory Board members to serve as a part-time financial officer. Such a move was mandated by the fact that the financial complexities of managing a four-station radio network are growing. The same can be said about our financial needs. The new financial officer will work without remuneration.

Plans continue to develop for a series of open house events at our new location at 108 Boeykens Place in Normal. Visitors will soon be able to see our new main office, control room, production studio, chapel, conference room, Ven. Fulton J. Sheen display materials, and more. Work continues apace to finish installation of a number of displays and workstations in time for open house events likely to be scheduled around *SPiRiT Radio’s* 10th anniversary on March 9, 2021.
